

The September meeting of the Committee



Meeting summary and main issues

- The full Committee met in London on 24th and 25th September 2025
- Committee discussions included preparation for the upcoming CPCF negotiations and updates on economic and dispensing projects
- The Committee had a full session on strategy and tactics ahead of the upcoming negotiations

The two days also covered other topics including:

- Inputs from across the sector into the negotiations from LPCs, sector bodies, summer pharmacy owner events and pre-committee opinion polling
- Subcommittees considered progress on critical CPCF implementation work and other matters
- Rebalancing Committee composition



Meeting summary and main issues

- First meeting for the new non-executive Chair of Community Pharmacy England, Professor Dame Jenny Harries DBE DL
- The chair role includes leadership of the Community Pharmacy England Committee, supporting strong governance and strategic delivery, and working closely with the Executive Team to enable effective engagement with business owners and wider stakeholders
- As a former Deputy Chief Medical Officer for England and the founding Chief Executive of the UK Health Security Agency, we look forward to bringing Professor Harries' extensive knowledge and experience to bear in our work and ambitions
- She's is very much looking forward to engaging with you and will attend the Conference of LPC Representatives in November — a great opportunity for introductions





Subcommittee updates

Service Development

- Reviewed work to implement October CPCF service changes – Pharmacy First gateway points, emergency contraception, depression in NMS, child flu vacs
- Discussed feedback on seasonal vaccination services
- Reviewed policy on health campaigns
 & progress on IP Pathfinder
 Programme

Funding & Contract

- Discussed important topics aimed at easing cashflow and providing a more equitable distribution of funding
- Considered how best to take forward plans for accelerated advance payments
- Discussed initiatives around delivering and validating retained margin

- Discussed submissions for possible regulatory asks
- Considered response to Government consultation on pharmacist flexibilities


- Agreed next steps on sharing of KPIs with LPCs, and support for LPCs with KPIs

Work ahead of the CPCF negotiations and what we have heard from you



CPCF Negotiation: Prior to starting

Community Pharmacy England works to influence Government spending decisions on an ongoing basis, including with:

- Analysis and economic evidence: tailored to match the way Government makes spending decisions and showing the state and value of the sector.
- Influencing Government processes: Spending review submission
- Building support for the sector and pitching solutions: Policy work builds support from charities, patient groups, and others to influence NHS policies.
- Political influencing: to influence ministers and Government policy.
- Monitoring: funding, services, pressures and cost pressures.
- Regulatory support: input to new legislation and pressing for improvements.











Sector inputs ahead of the negotiations

- We have gathered insights from pharmacy owners across the sector via a variety of routes:
 - through opinion polling, with over 4,000 pharmacy premises represented in our polls in June and
 September
 - through input from other sector bodies, who we wrote to over the summer asking for their thoughts and ideas
 - through our sector workshops held in every region during the summer, with LPCs and Pharmacy Owners
 - To supplement our own work on financial analysis, policy development, committee strategy and tactics discussions
- The team will also be attending the Pharmacy Show this autumn, where we'll continue these conversations – we're running several sessions to update on our key workstreams, and we will also have a stand – H55



Negotiations Inputs: Outlook & Pressures

Sector polling showed:

- 90% say that their biggest challenge is that core funding is still not sufficient to cover current business costs
- 75% express negative sentiment about the outlook for their pharmacy business:
 - 54% say they are subsidising from other parts of the business
 - 13% losing money at a concerning rate
- Workforce costs and unpredictable revenue stream are currently the



Negotiations Inputs: 10 Year Health Plan

Sector polling showed:

- Confidence to deliver on almost all pharmacy services described in 10 Year
 Health Plan
- 87% say specific funding to support implementation would help aid their confidence, with other suggestions including appropriate service fees, protected learning time, interoperable record access and GP buy-in
- Developing the NHS App so patients can manage medicines and access pharmacy services was ranked as the most important pharmacy-related element, with modernisation of dispensing second



Negotiations Inputs: Immediate CPCF Priorities

Workshops indicated:

- Strong concern about unpredictability of current funding, with a clear appetite for income streams they can influence and control directly
- Many advocated for a core payment to reduce operational risk, enable safe staffing levels, and provide a stable foundation for business planning
- Wanted economic stability and a more transparent and reliable funding model





Negotiations Inputs: Future CPCF Priorities

Workshops indicated:

 Vaccination services and independent prescribing for common conditions were consistently highlighted as high priorities for future services

Polling showed:

- Pursue pre-agreed closures to support staff training and development
- Top three service options were an NHS weight management service, increasing vaccination services, and a walk-in service for urgent supply strand of Pharmacy First



Publication of our Annual Report

- Other key priority areas of work for this year are set out in our vision, strategy and objectives and our final workplan for 2025/26 (previously shared)
- Our 2024/25 annual report, published 30th September describes the value we have generated for pharmacy owners and the impact we have on investment, clinical service development and ongoing influence

Governance: Committee Composition

Committee Composition: Update

- In September, the Committee agreed new interim arrangements, that will come into effect from 1st November 2025 and last until elections are completed in April 2027.
- IPA will nominate two 10-plus multiple representatives to the committee (owner of the business, or employee with significant authority in the business). This is in addition to the existing three members of the Committee in the non-CCA multiples category, taking the total to 5.
- The CCA appointments will be reduced by one place and an additional independent (1-9) will be co-opted to the Committee.



Committee Composition: Update

- The changes to composition will better reflect the make-up of the sector following change in ownership mix. They follow a consultation with LPCs and sector bodies – thank you for your views.
- An external expert recommended to increase the numbers of 10+ multiple owners on the Committee and to give the IPA appointment rights to Community Pharmacy England. There were also recommendations for LPCs, which will be captured in future revisions to the model constitution.
- A meeting between us and the sector bodies CCA, IPA and NPA was then held over the summer, where consensus was sought and a provisional agreement reached on arrangements to be in place until elections in April 2027.



Committee Composition: Next steps

- We will be seeking expressions of interest from independents (1–9) who are serving elected LPC members to be co-opted to the Committee from November 2025 until 31st March 2027, as a floating regional representative.
- In addition to being an independent (elected) LPC member they must be the owner (either individually or in partnership) or a director and substantiate shareholder either personally, or through shares owned by members of their immediate family, i.e. parents, spouse or children) in a body corporate which is an Independent Pharmacy Owner
- A panel of regional representatives will select a candidate with the aim of seeking to complement and increase the diversity, knowledge and skills of existing 10 regional representatives, as well as the geography of representation from LPCs on the Committee.




Timeline for new appointments

- IPA will nominate two 10-plus multiple representatives to the committee (owner of the business, or employee with significant authority in the business) effective from November 2025
- Expressions of interest for the independent (1–9) places will open on Wednesday 1st October until Sunday 19th October 2025. A short selection process including shortlisting and interviews by an appointment panel will take place between Monday 27th October and Friday 7th November.

Future levy setting

- Considerations about funding for representation in 2026/27 will form part of our planning process from November 2025, concluding with our budget in February 2026


